Our Holy God Genesis 6-9

Getting Started

Noah "found favor" in the eyes of the Lord. In other words, he was an undeserving recipient of God's grace. How has God been gracious to you in recent weeks?

Key Ideas for Discussion

- 1. Humanity is radically and totally corrupted by sin. (Vs.6:5, 11-13; 8:21)
- 2. God's judgement is the right response to sin, reflecting both His holiness and love. (vs.6:6-7)
- 3. Because He is gracious, God provides salvation for sinners who trust Him. (vss.6:8-9)

Takeaway Truth: There is a future judgement coming that demands our preparation and proclamation of the gospel. (9:11-13; Mt. 24:37-39; 2 Peter 3:5-7)

Digging Deeper

- ❖ What was the Lord's assessment of the spiritual condition of the human race before the Flood? (Gen. 6:5, 11, 12)
- ❖ What was the Lord's emotional reaction to human degradation? (Gen. 6:6)
- ❖ Why was the Lord's response to Noah different? (Gen. 6:8, 9)
- ❖ In Genesis 6:18-21, what were the terms of the covenant the Lord made with Noah in each of these areas: People, Other Creatures, Provisions?
- ❖ Where did the waters come from that flooded the earth in judgment? (Gen. 7:11)
- ❖ How did the Flood accomplish its terrible work of judgment? (Gen. 7:20-24)
- Why did the Lord have Noah take more clean animals and birds than unclean animals? (Gen. 8:20)
- ❖ How have you seen the Lord judge sin in your life or in the life of someone else? Did He allow sowing and reaping to take its course, or did He intervene directly? How was the judgment an act of mercy and preservation for the one judged or for others?
- * Read the first 6 verses of chapter 9. What do they teach us about murder? Why do you think God put these verses here immediately after the Flood?
- Chapter 9 very much communicates a fresh start for humanity and creation. What fresh starts has the Lord granted you in your life?

Think About It!

Human violence wins if you don't believe in the doctrine of divine judgment. Here's what those three problems are. If you don't believe in divine judgment, you have no intellectual defense against the naturalness of violence, you have no emotional defense against the poisonousness of violence, and you have no cultural defense against the endlessness of violence.
